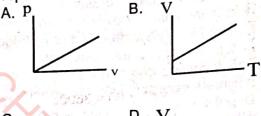

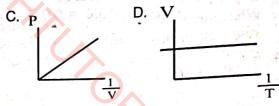

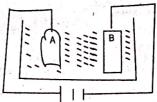

- (1)(a)(i) According to the Lewis concept, an acid is a substance which is able to attach itself to an unshared pair of electrons to form a new compound. (ii) AICI<sub>2</sub>, Aluminium chloride (iv)
- (b) Salting is the act of adding concentrated sodium chloride to soap in order to decrease the solubility.
- (c) Ammonial solution of AgNO<sub>3</sub> at room temperature.
- (d) Percentage abundance of an isotope is the percentage of naturally occuring atoms with specific atomic mass of element.

- Group 1 elements react by forming positive ions; the higher the ionisation energy, the more difficult it is to lose the electron, hence the lower the reactivity of the elements. OR lonisation energy decreases down group 1 elements; the lower the ionisation energy, the easier to lose an electron, hence the higher the reactivity of the elements. OR the ionisation energy increases across the period and decreases down the period which makes sodium more reactive.

#### **SECTION B**

2(a)(i) First ionisation energy is the energy required to remove one electron from a mole of a gaseous atom. OR It is the minimum energy required to convert one mole of a gaseous plus 1 ions. OR It is the amount of energy needed to extract the first loose bonding electron in the outermost shell of a gaseous atom.

(ii) Be: 1s<sup>2</sup>, 2s<sup>2</sup> <sub>5</sub>B: 1s<sup>2</sup>, 2s<sup>2</sup>, 2p<sup>1</sup>

The electron to be removed from Be is in the 2s orbital which is closer to the nucleus, nuclear attraction is greatrer. Hence, first ionisation energy is greater but the electron to be removed from B is in the 2p orbital which is farther away from the nucleus. Hence, nuclear attraction is weaker; hence, first ionisation energy is smaller. OR 2p has less energy than 2s. So, it is easier to remove an electron from 2p as nuclear charge is weaker in 2p because 2p is further away from the nucleus. Hence, first ionisation energy is small. OR The outermost shell in Be is filled up unlike B which has only one electron and this makes it easier for one electron to be taken out (donated). Hence, the ionisation energy of Be is higher than that of B.
