Furthermore, of importance is the fact that the lack of maintenance of public facilities is a great barrier to national development in Nigeria. As a way out of this ugly trend, the government needs to engage in proper sensitisation of the masses to make them understand the effects of vandalism and the fact that public facilities are owned by the citizens and are meant to serve them.
