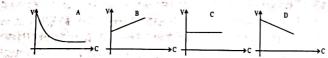

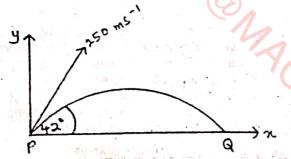

- 8.(a)(i) A body will continue in its present state of rest. OR If it is in motion, it will continue to move with uniform speed in a straight line unless it is acted upon by a force.
 - (ii) When the brakes of the moving vehicles are suddenly applied, or the vehicle collides, the passenger jerks forward as they tend to continue in a straight line. The seat belt helps to provide a backward force and reduces injuries.
