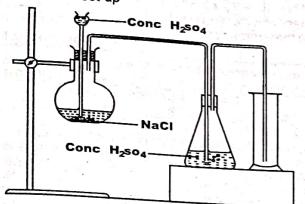

## ANSWERS TO JUNE 2007 WASSCE CHEMISTRY 2 THEORY

1(a)(i) A saturated solution is one that will dissolve no more of the solute at a particular temperature in the presence of excess solute A saturated solution is a solution that will not dissolve any more of the solute at a particular temperature in the presence of excess solute. A saturated solution is a solution in which the solute is in dynamic equilibrium with the solution at a particular temperature.

(ii) Solubility is the maximum amount of solute (number of moles/mass) that dissolves in 1 dm3 of solvent at a

particular temperature or

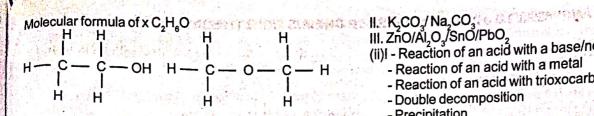

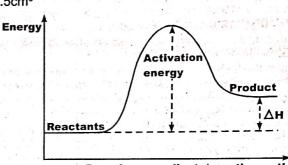
